Course Description

In this level, students will work through an intensive review of grammar and focus on how to articulate and organize ideas. Reading, writing, and textual analysis tend to be the focal points. Students will improve their skills on different writing assignments, incorporating the acquired grammatical structures and discover selected cultural topics through text and video.

Course Objectives

Grammar:

- Pronouns and adjectives: indefinites
- Compound relative pronouns
- Verb tenses and aspects: the future past, conditional (present and past); the subjunctive (present and past); gerundives
- Logical connectors: cause, consequence, goal: concession and opposition, hypothesis and condition
- Sentence structure: reported speech

Socio-cultural topics:

 Topics may be drawn from diverse areas of Francophone culture including cinema, civilization of Southern France, heritage studies, economic and social sciences, art history, and literature.

Methodology

The student's grade will be based on an oral exposé, a research paper, and an essay question.

Course Prerequisites

Students must have completed FREN 1004 or the equivalent of 4th semester college-level French. $\bf Grading$
